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Introduction:

Asperger disease was first described in the 1940s by Vienna pediatrician Hans Asperger, who observed autism-like behaviors and difficulties in social and communication skills in boys with normal intelligence and language development. Asperger syndrome is a milder form of autism, and the term "high-performance autism" has been used to describe these individuals.



Causes of the disease:

The World Health Organization stated in its report issued in 2013 that there are some scientific studies that indicated that the reason lies in environmental and genetic factors that cause disturbances in early brain development, and the proportion is higher in males than in females.



What is Asperger Syndrome ?

It is a complex developmental disability marked by impairments in socialization, communication, cognition, and sensation. Like classic autism, Asperger Syndrome is a neurological disorder that affects a person's ability to communicate and relate to others.



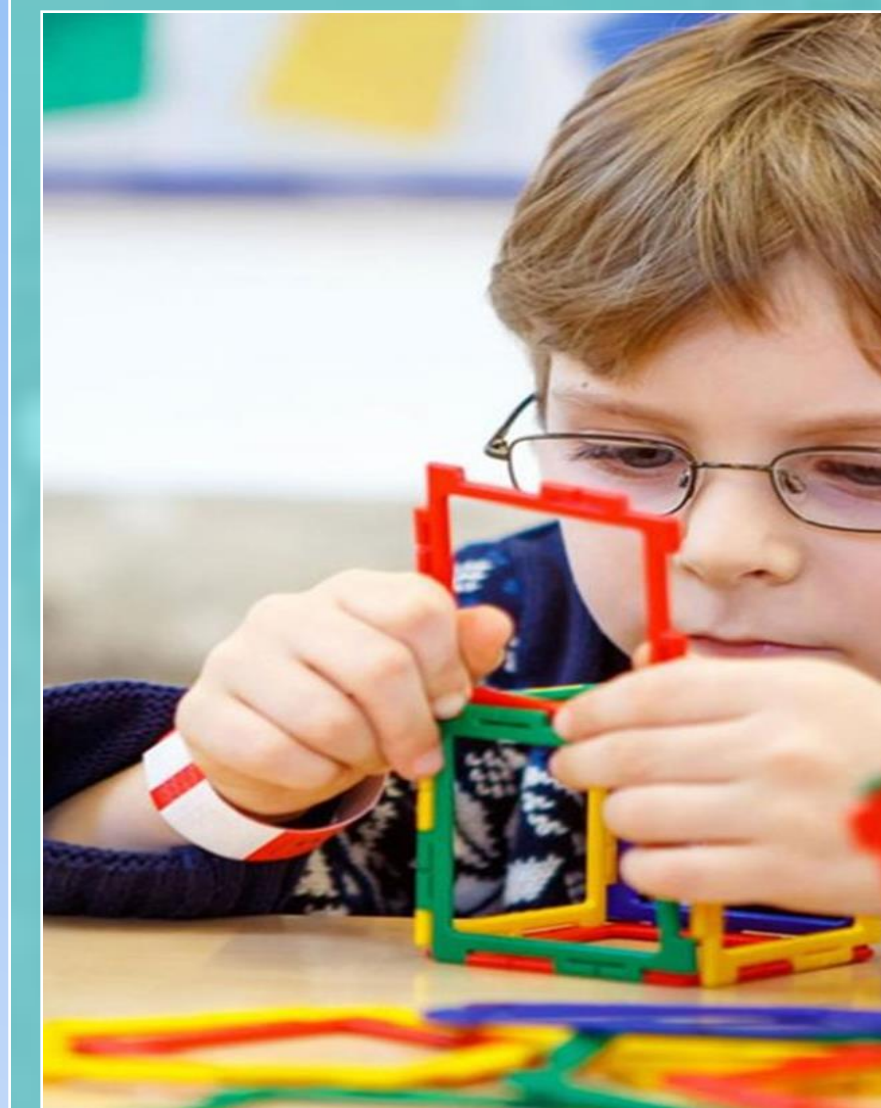
How is Asperger's Syndrome treated ?

Because each case is different, treatment plans must be built according to each child's needs. They should be adjusted over time as those needs change. Treatment of Asperger's Syndrome usually includes:

Social skills training, Behavior support, Cognitive behavioral therapy, Parent education, Special education.

Symptoms of the disease:

- 1-Inability to communicate well.
- 2-Not being aware of feelings such as anger sadness, and happiness.
- 3-Repetition of movements or words and phrases.
- 4- Looking at the light head.
